### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

### **Student Leaders Induction Ceremony**

Last week, the school community joined together to induct the school leaders for 2021. Our school captains, vice captains, student representative council, junior AECG and house captains were inducted to their leadership roles. Members of the leadership team shared some of their qualities which included honesty, assertiveness, empathy, trustworthiness, responsibility, and skills of organisation, listening, delegation. I feel that our student leaders are well prepared for their roles and have the students' interests forefront in their thoughts.

### NSW Government's co-contribution Renewal Program

I am pleased to share the news that Gilgandra High School has been successful in an application for funding to deliver a project that will include the construction of a COLA (Covered Outdoor Learning Area). This will be built with co-contribution of funds from the school and the government to provide a new concrete slab and COLA that will deliver both shade in the summer and a dry space in the rain, for classes, break times, and for the school community to utilise.

### **Assessment Schedules**

Assessment schedules have been distributed to students across the school to assist with them planning forward as the year progresses. At times, amendments are required to be made and teachers will provide notification to students of any changes to the schedules in the booklets. Students should speak directly to their classroom teacher about any questions they may have about their individual subject schedule.

### School Psychologist appointment

This term, we have had the support of Cathryn Worthington in the role of school counsellor. Cathryn has been a great asset to the school and has supported many students and families in the past 10 weeks. I would like to thank Cathryn for the hard work that she has done in a short time and the effort that she has made to get to know our students and families. Cathryn will continue to support the schools in the Dubbo area for the remainder of 2021. The Department of Education made a commitment to schools that they would provide permanent school counsellor or school psychologist appointments to all schools. We have been successful in having a school psychologist appointed to Gilgandra High School from the beginning of Term 2. Camilla Griffiths will join our team and will fill the maximum quota of time our school is allocated; being 5 days per fortnight. We look forward to Camilla joining the Gilgandra High School staff.

### The Career Experience 2021

As part of our ongoing commitment to provide career exposure for all our students at GHS, we are hoping to launch a new idea titled The Career Experience. I draw your attention to an issue at Gilgandra High School and in schools across NSW. Vaping is the inhaling of a vapor created by an electronic cigarette (e-cigarette) or another vaping device. Vaping in adolescence can have devastating and lasting effects. Vaping, including the use of e-cigarettes, is prohibited:

- on all school premises and in administrative areas
- at all public transport stops and stations in NSW
- on transport to and from school
- and during any school-based activities.

Dear Parent/Carer

I write to share my recent concerns regarding students smoking, including electronic cigarettes (vaping). Students have been observed smoking/vaping in and around school grounds.

Smoking, which now includes the use of electronic cigarettes (vaping) has been prohibited on all school premises and in administrative areas since July 1988. Smoking/vaping is also prohibited at all public transport stops and stations in NSW and on transport to and from school.

### **Health risks**

Smoking is a major risk factor for a variety of diseases and conditions, including but not limited to:

- Coronary Heart Disease: 10 times higher risk than non-smokers;
- Stroke and Peripheral Vascular disease;
- Lung Cancer: 20 times higher risk than non-smokers;
- other cancers such as stomach, bladder, mouth and cervical cancer;
- Emphysema;
- Osteoporosis; and
- Type 2 Diabetes and metabolic syndrome.

**Electronic cigarettes (E-cigarettes)** can contain high levels of nicotine. Adolescence is a critical period for brain development and exposure to nicotine can have long-term health consequences, impacting memory, attention and learning.

E-cigarettes are often available in different flavours which can be appealing to young people and may expose them to chemicals and toxins such as formaldehyde, heavy metals, particulate matter and flavouring chemicals, at levels that have the potential to cause adverse health effects.

**Second-hand smoke** exposure can cause disease and premature death in children and adults who do not smoke. Specifically, children exposed to second-hand smoke experience a range of upper and lower respiratory illnesses and symptoms such as colds and flu, cough, phlegm production, wheezing and pneumonia.

### What we are doing to support your child's health

We will continue to take appropriate opportunities to promote the Department's policy on smoking on school premises. We will also report any breaches of outdoor smoking bans to NSW Health via an online portal.

### Your support

There are ways you can help protect your children. These include:

- Talking to your child about why smoking/vaping are harmful for them. It is never too late to have the conversation
- Learning about the different types of e-cigarettes available and the risks associated with using these products
- Setting a good example by being tobacco free
- Reporting those who are selling cigarettes and e-cigarettes to minors.
