

Year 8 Technology



From our Deputy

Welcome back to Term 3. I hope everyone enjoyed their holidays and are ready and equipped for an action-packed term full of opportunity and learning.

One way in which parents and caregivers can become involved in your child's learning is to ask questions about their day. If you ask, 'how was your day' you may receive a reply such as 'good', if you asked 'what did you do today' a standard response maybe 'nothing'. If you would like to engage further in your child's education a few questions you maybe able to ask include:

- 1. What did you learn today?
- 2. How did you do?
- 3. What did you do if you didn't understand?
- 4. How can you improve on your learning?
- 5. What are you most proud of?

This term, the whole school has a focus on vocabulary. Across the school students have been learning to define, look at characteristics, identify synonyms, identify antonyms, and use 6 focus words in sentences. The focus words for the first half of the term are: **Established, consequence, insignificant, interpretation, accomplished and inconsistent**. Why not start a learning conversation with your child about these words?

With examinations coming up this term for Year 11 and 12, there are ways that you and your mates can help support each other. Some tips to help support you and others include:

- Be proud of your resilience Look back and see how far you have come. Give yourself a pat on the back and be confident
- Check in with a friend Schedule a time to check in with a friend and let them know that you are thinking of them
- Take a study break Studying requires sustenance. Go have something to eat together.
- Do physical activities together Take the edge of study stress and lock in a time to do fun exercise
- Make post -examination plans Encourage your mates to tell you what they are looking forward to. Focus on the welldeserved celebratory plans
- Reach out for help if the problem is bigger than you or your friend can handle, reach out to supports from schools such as your mentor, your classroom teachers, Year Advisor, Meagan (GHS Student Support Officer), Mrs Schier (Head Teacher Wellbeing), Camilla Griffiths (School Psychologist).

Year 10 Science

Year 10 Science students made models of DNA using lollies as part of their study of genetics. Sour worms were used to represent nucleotides and snakes were used to represent the sugar phosphate backbone of DNA. Students then twisted their model to make the famous double helix structure that characterises DNA.

Year 11 English Advanced

For the past 10 weeks, the 7 members of the Year 11 English Advanced class have been exploring the concept of Narratives that Shape our World. They examined the presentation of this notion across a variety of texts including: the Old Testament story David and Goliath, monologues from Shakespeare's Henry V, the Crimean War poem The Charge of the Light Brigade by Alfred Lord Tennyson, quotes from JRR Tolkien's The Lord of the Rings, Christopher Nolan's feature film Dunkirk and the song This is Me from The Greatest Showman. For their assessment, they were each required to submit an extended response with an accompanying multimodal construction of their choosing. The submissions were all executed to an extremely high standard and no two were the same. Formats included a slideshow with embedded commentary, a visual pin board with recorded commentary, a reveal box with a QR code linked to a filmed commentary, a triptych of canvases, a newspaper broadsheet, a diorama illuminated by lights and an intricate poster presentation. The entire class is commended for their efforts.

Student Absence

It is important to tell the school if your child has to be absent from school and to provide a reason for the absence. Principals are legally responsible for keeping accurate records of student attendance. Principals are also responsible for deciding if the reason given for the absence is justified. Wherever possible, parents and carers are encouraged to provide an explanation for absences before the absences occur.


The Principal of the school has the right to question a parent's requests for their child to be absent from school. The Principal also has the right to question an explanation given for a student's absence from school. To explain an absence, parents and carers may:

- Send a signed, and dated, note or email to the school
- Telephone the school
- Add a Future Absence on the Parent Portal, or
- Reply to the SMS message from GHS regarding your child's absence

If you receive an SMS message from GHS regarding absence, late arrival or truancy of your child you are able to reply to the message at no cost to yourself.

This service is very reliable and a prompt response from parents/carers provides GHS with the confirmation required to justify the absence of your child and adjust our records accordingly.

If you would like further information about acceptable reasons to be absent from school, we are happy to provide further information.









What Science teacher doesn't LOVE term 3? Answer = None!

It's our favourite term because we get to celebrate NATIONAL SCIENCE WEEK (more about that later).



Before we get to NATIONAL SCIENCE WEEK, we have so much more going on, so try and keep up.



Week 3 is Education Week and this year, for the first time at Gilgandra High School, 19 students will be participating in the International Chemistry Quiz, which is coordinated through the Royal Australian Chemical Institute.

These 19 students will engage in a 60-minute online quiz, competing against students from 21 other countries. In the lead up to this event, these students have been provided with online practice quiz opportunities in order to set them up for success on the day. The Science faculty is very proud of all those who have chosen to put their knowledge to the test and have entered the quiz, and we look forward to celebrating their success with you.

Week 6 is NATIONAL SCIENCE WEEK and that means fun in Science Teacher Land.





All students who are interested in any area of Science including STEM, farming, machinery, environmental science, mechanics, architecture or any other idea are encouraged to enter the UNSW Bragg competition.

Students are encouraged to write an 800-word essay on How Science Impacts Their Everyday Lives. Miss Austen has provided copies of 'How to write a Science essay', as well as last year's winning and runner up entries for students as a guide to the style of writing that is expected. If you don't have one yet, be sure to pop past the Science staff room and grab yourself a copy. Miss Murphy has also been given a copy of each of these for students to access during homework centre on Wednesday afternoons.

Entries are due to by Friday 27th August, which means those wanting to submit will need to get their entries to Miss Austen by Friday 20th August, to give her time to upload and submit everything on time.

There is lots happening in Science this term and we look forward to sharing these fun learning opportunities with the students, parents, caregivers and community members as the term progresses.

All students in Years 7 and 8 have now been issued with a homework booklet. These homework booklets are due to the classroom teacher at the end of each week for checking. The content contained in the science homework books is directly related to the content being covered in class and has a literacy or numeracy focus. It is not expected that students complete the entire booklet in 1 week. Rather, students should aim to complete 2-3 pages of Science homework each week, in order to remain up to date.

The Science faculty would also like to extend a very big THANK YOU to the ongoing community support we receive for our Stage 6 students. At the end of Term 2, Year 12 Chemistry was fortunate enough to be able to visit Black Gate Distillery, as part of their mandatory field work component of their HSC.

Students were able to go behind the scenes and talk Industrial Chemistry with Brian and learn about the industrial and commercial importance of scientific accuracy, measurement, cost and scale. Brian also discussed real world applications and factors that impacted his business such as the drought and the mouse plague. This all has the potential to support the students when they are writing their HSC examination responses.









Brian demonstrated the use of industrial scientific equipment for the students, which allowed them the opportunity to link the theory they have learnt in class to a real-world context. Students were offered the opportunity to ask questions about large scale processes,

This experience was invaluable to the students and was provided at no cost to the school or students. It is wonderful that we are fortunate enough to work in a community that is so supportive of our students' academic growth and success. Again, a very big thank you to Brian for giving up his time on the day.

The Science faculty is continually looking for opportunities to support the academic growth, development and engagement of its students. The ongoing support from the community, and the high standard of academic achievement of students in Science at Gilgandra High School allow for exciting opportunities and experiences that will see this term be a fun packed and exciting one in Science.




Mathematics Faculty

12 Mathematics classes are finishing up the last of their topics and then will be revising in preparation for their examinations starting in Week 6.



































Music

Our Year 11 class are currently part way through their minor project, which provides them with ideal practice before they start the journey of their major project later this year.








Exciting News
