From our Principal

NAPLAN

Students in Years 7 and 9 have commenced their Literacy and Numeracy assessments over the next two weeks.

NAPLAN is a national literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students have the opportunity to undertake.

As students progress through their school years, it's important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national standards and over time.

Attendance

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling. Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The Importance of arriving on time- Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.


What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence.





School voluntary contribution and subject fees

I would like to thank the families that have paid their voluntary contribution and/or subject fees for 2023. GHS has traditionally tried to keep the voluntary contribution cost to a minimum, despite the current secondary voluntary contribution set at \$108 per student – GHS has reduced this to \$50 per student.

These contributions/fees help to enhance educational programs at the school and in particular help to cover the consumable materials students use in their elective subjects. This year we will be giving away an iPad (9th Gen) to one student in Week 5, Term 2. To be eligible, any student who has paid their subject fees in full by the end of Week 4, Term 2 will automatically be entered in the draw.




From our Parents & Citizens

All positions will be declared vacant so come along and hear what the school has achieved in the last 12 months. Maybe consider an executive position or just be an active member. We would love to see you all there.



Around our School

Adventures in the English/HSIE Faculty:

On Tuesday 7th March, Year 7 Wiradjuri and Year 9 Aboriginal Studies took part in an excursion called Connecting to Country. The excursion was to Coonabarabran and the surrounding area visiting, significant sites.

The students were immersed in learning about the history and past policies which impacted Aboriginal Australians and they gained a new perspective on Aboriginal Culture, history and lifestyles.

Sights visited were Hickey's Falls, Coonabarabran Yarning Circle, Gunnedah Hill, Sandstone Caves and Burra Bee Dee Mission.

Hickey's Falls is located just past the boundaries of Gamilaroi Country, whilst there we learnt that at the top was a sacred sight for secret men's business. We all paid our respects in language when we visited each site by saying **"I/We Respect Country" "Nhadhu Yidnyamarra Ngurambang"**

We arrived in Coonabarabran and stopped at the 'Yarning Circle.' Kimm shared yarns about the history of Mary Jane Cain, who the bridge is named after, and her importance to the people and the significance to bridge has to the town.

We then travelled to the Sandstone Caves where students learnt of the wildlife, plants and ancient Aboriginal rock art and engravings.

The bus trip was full of interesting yarns with Kimm and a wonderful experience was had by all who attended.

White Cross Mobile Dental Care Program will be visiting Gilgandra High School during Week 11.






The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a point in time assessment of literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Each year students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in tests for writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

From 2023, NAPLAN is moving to Term 1, the reason for this change is so that results can be returned to schools earlier in the year which will support teachers to understand the learning needs of their students and plan accordingly.

Gilgandra High School will be conducting NAPLAN in Weeks 8 and 9. Starting on Wednesday 15 March- Writing, Thursday 16 March – Reading, Friday 17 March – Conventions of Language and concluding on Monday 20 March - Numeracy. Opportunities for catch-up test will be available for the remainder of Week 9.

NAPLAN tests are just one part of our school learning assessment program and questions are primarily based on knowledge, understanding and skills gained from the prior year of schooling.

In preparation for NAPLAN 2023, our school will undertake activities to help students to become familiar with the format and functionality of the online tests. These activities are not an assessment of student ability and will not be marked.





NAPLAN timetable

The NAPLAN test window is 9 days. This is to accommodate schools that may have fewer devices.

The NAPLAN test window starts on Wednesday 15 March and finishes on Monday 27 March 2023. Schools are advised to schedule the tests as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.


Mulgabirra Program





Mathematics

Year 11 Numeracy


The Year 11 Numeracy class have commenced their studies with units looking at whole numbers and operations with whole numbers. They have engaged with many activities that have allowed them to take their learning outside.

In one activity, the students estimated the number of times that they could get a basketball in the hoop in 1 minute and then compared this to their actual result. This was repeated three times, allowing them to use their actual result to inform their estimations. They later performed various mathematical operations with the data collected. Brock Dezius successfully shot the most hoops in any round.

Most recently, they used cumulative frequency tables to keep score in the Finish log throwing game, Finska. Using this approach allows competitors to easily see who is winning the game at any given point.

Inside the classroom, the students have played Bingo which has allowed them to develop their fluency in adding two-digit numbers. They also investigated the population of various towns and cities within Australia. These figures were then put into descending order and students considered what was significant about those cities with the largest population and the influence that has on resources.

On Monday 27th February, Year 12 Hospitality, Year 10 Food Technology A & B catered at Gilgandra's Seniors Luncheon held at the Gilgandra Shire Hall. The students were able to use their skills and knowledge to present a lovely lunch. They day was a beautiful celebration of Gilgandra's older citizens with plenty of local talent on display.

Science

Year 7

Students in year 7 have successfully obtained their Bunsen burner licenses and are now using these to complete practical investigations, broadening their exposure and confidence in recognising and using scientific equipment.

Year 8

Year 8 have continued to learn about different system within the body. With the aid of microscopes, they have looked at microscope slides of blood cells and now have a greater understanding of the size of blood cells.

Year 8 have also had the opportunity to participate in heart dissections.

The Science faculty would like to acknowledge and thank the kindness of our local butcher Mr Diggs, from Digg's butchery Gilgandra, for once again donating the hearts to the faculty. Your ongoing support of students at Gilgandra High School is valued and highly appreciated. Without this donation, the students would not be able to participate in such an educationally rich experience.

Year 8 have also learnt about many other systems, including the urinary and skeletal. Miss Hoy supports her students remembering the different parts of the skeletal system by engaging them in a tournament of "Simon Says".

Year 9

Year 9 have also been learning about the inner working of the body. They have looked at the brain and the body's difference lines of defence. Miss Austen like to challenge her students to engage their frontal lobe with the challenging activity of "Memory".

Year 10

Year 10 are on the topic of forces and are learning about Newtons 3 laws of motion. They have been working on designing and creating their own Newton's cradles (Newtons 3rd law. Ask them). Here are some photos of the construction phase. Next term we will unveil the final products.

Bio

Students are finishing Module 1 Cells as the Basis of Life in Week 8, with an exam style practice to provide formative feedback on their progress. Moving onto Module 2 Organisation of Living Things.

Earth and Environmental Science






Year 12

Biology

Year 12 Biology are hard at work in Module 6 of the HSC syllabus. They are examining the impacts that allele distribution has on a population. Here they are visualising the effect of 'Genetic drift' and 'the bottleneck effect' with the aid of M&Ms and some very creative natural disasters.

During Year 7 Wellbeing lessons this fortnight, students have been focusing on the theme "Caring for Others". Students brainstormed ways in which they can show their families, friends and others how they care about them. We discussed how the world is a wonderful place, but has a lot of problems such as pollution, conflict, poverty and illness. From this they were asked to be designers and create a T-shirt based on one of these themes.

Year 7 showed great enthusiasm and fantastic design skills.

This coming fortnight Year 7 will be learning about Growth Mindset, practising to focus on the present moment. An important message will be that anyone can do what they set their mind to.
